MOST COMPREHENSIVE YOUTH
PROGRAMS IN NEW YORK**

As we approach the season for Presidential primaries anxiously waiting to see which Democrat will be chosen to challenge President George W. Bush for the White House, a popular slogan from a presidential campaign of bygone years comes to mind; "WHERE'S THE BEEF?" This confrontational sound bite is the product of Madison Avenue genius, created for Wendy's. It was the standard bearer of commercials in the battle to capture the appetite of the American public for fast food. Now, "WHERE'S THE BEEF?" can be asked in relation to so many temples in the metropolitan New York area when we compare what they profess and "advertise" regarding their youth programs and putting youth first and the meager offerings that they actually provide for their religious school students at all ages and stages of their social, intellectual and religious development.

"We Of The Temple Israel Family" are the exception. Children are our priority. The needs of our religious school students, their families and our youth are our number one priority. We are the "Youth Congregation" of the 5 Towns and in this way, follow the central commandment within Judaism, to engage, and enrich the lives of our children through involvement in Temple life, Jewish values and dynamic Jewish living.

We see Judaism's emphasis on young people in the central prayer and the pivotal celebration of our faith. The *Shema*, the "watch word of our faith", talks about our duty to enrich the lives of our children by providing them with an understanding of who we are, what we believe and what our obligations are to our fellow human beings and the "Holy". The Passover Seder has been meticulously crafted to involve our children in the story of our Exodus from Egyptian bondage and how we emerged to be "*A Kingdom of Priests and a Holy Nation*".

Therefore, I am proud to announce, that our Officers and Board of Trustees unanimously endorsed a comprehensive youth and high school program at their May meeting. Youth Groups will be established for religious school students in grades 5 and 6, and 7 and 8, respectively called "The 56 Club and 78 Club".

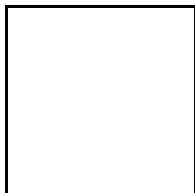

I had the great privilege, with Rabbi Rosenbaum and Principal Mahfouda, to help prepare our students for this life-cycle event and be a part of the continuation of their Jewish education.

I would like to extend my congratulations to this year's Bar/Bat Mitzvah students; they never failed to meet my expectations, and whose efforts and hard work was on proud display on each of their special days. Dr. Nachama is the son of the late Cantor Nachama, a survivor of Auschwitz who, until his recent passing, was regarded as one of the greatest Cantors in Europe and served for over 50 years as Chazzan at the Reform Temple in Berlin.

Rabbi Andreas Nachama advises Jewish organizations, including the World Jewish Congress, the American Jewish Committee, the Anti-Defamation League and the North American Boards of Rabbis on the dangers and status of Anti-Semitism in Europe and is a respected advisor to World leaders in Europe, North America and Israel.

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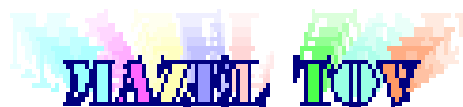
WORD TO THE WISE

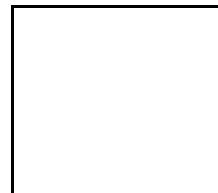

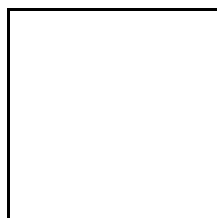
“WHERE’S THE BEEF?” When it comes to temple youth and our high school students it’s right here at Temple Israel in substantial and nourishing portions.

MESSAGE FROM

Rabbi Joel Zion, Rabbi Emeritus
Excerpts from sermon on Martin Buber

Who was Martin Buber, who is today one of the best known theologians in the world? Born in the Vienna of Sigmund Freud and Theodor Herzl, he was raised in a middle class family. His parents were divorced when he was three, and he went to live in Poland with his grandfather. So brilliant was he that, at 13, his Bar Mitzvah talk was on philosophy. At the age of 17, he entered the university of Vienna, and wrote his doctoral thesis on Christian mysticism. Many years later, he returned to Poland, where he was greatly influenced by the Chassidim. He saw how they worshipped the Almighty with enthusiasm and ecstasy. He noted that their relationship with God was like an enthusiastic dialogue between two persons. ...

There have always been two streams in Jewish life which have interpreted Jewish law differently. On the one hand, we have the legalists who believe that none of the law may be changed. They may be compared to the strict constructionists of the American constitution. When it says, "Rest on the Sabbath," it means don't pick up the phone. On the other hand, there is the liberal element who believe that Jewish law is meant to be lived, not to be worshipped as an idol. Buber accepts Jewish law and the concept of doing a mitzvah, but it must be done with Kavanah; by Kavanah, he taught that when a deed is done or a prayer is recited, there must be a living, immediate relationship with God. If not, the mitzvah or the deed is only dry formalism. What he seeks for all actions is that an immediate, spontaneous response should arise in the person, or else the performance of the law becomes an idol, an end in itself. . .

In this age of massive de-personalization, when men are treated as things by other men, he believes that man can achieve his authentic personality only by turning to his fellow man in an I-thou relationship. What is this, I thou? You can call yourself I, only if you accept the fact that the person who you are with is a thou. In other words, no person is a thing. Our typical relationships Buber calls, I and it. But the true relationship is accepting the fact that every person we confront is a part of us, an extension of I. This extension he calls thou...

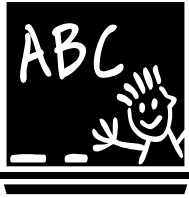

Not only did we hear many meaningful sermons delivered by the rabbi, but we were treated to the beautiful melodies delivered by the cantor. We also noted how week by week the attendance at these services has been growing. We certainly hope that our returning congregants will join the rest of us, so that they too will participate and enjoy this wonderful religious experience.

Many things are happening at Temple Israel. Not a week goes by that the local newspapers don't carry a story about Temple Israel and the special programs initiated by Rabbi Rosenbaum.

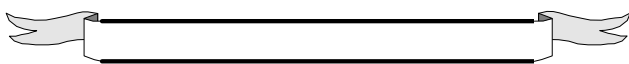

To Buber, there must be a total response, a genuine encounter of two people, if they are to be really present for each other. Ours is a culture in which all too many lack human warmth. In watching TV, a pretty blonde emerges from the sea; her face gets larger and larger and she says, "the Dodge rebellion wants you," suddenly, the lonely person feels wanted. Buber believes that we do not encounter each other in a real dialogue, a human dialogue that enables us to recognize and feel each other's need.

This I-thou relationship in which there is a genuine encounter between two people who are really present for each other, who are not dealing with one another as things, is not just a mystical expression. As a matter of fact, the I-thou relationship is opposed to mysticism. In a real encounter between two people, a man, and wife, a parent and child, a teacher and student, an employer and worker, there are several aspects. First there is a feeling of responsibility for the other. Second there is trust. A person who relates to another as an I to an it, makes the other an object of use, an object of employment or control. Buber believes that man can find his fulfillment only by living in a relationship, which will mutually confirm one another.

Buber has a high regard for the person. He teaches that every man is unique. Whenever a child is born, he says, another first man enters the world. Eric Fromm, in his book, "You Shall Be As Gods," points out that in the story of the creation of the world, at the end of each day's creation is the phrase, "and the Lord saw that it was good." But on the day when God creates man, there is no such phrase. This is to teach that man is always unfinished. That man has such remarkable potential within him that he is never truly complete.
