A MESSAGE FROM

Rabbi Joel Y. Zion

Last year, I participated in an all-day seminar sponsored by the Harvard University Center on Psychoanalysis. The theme was "Jewish Identity Crisis; from Freud to Ann Frank."

Most often quoted was Dr. Erik Erikson whose book "Childhood Youth and Society" has greatly influenced me. He stressed that to possess a well integrated personality, the growing child must develop a sense of rootedness, relatedness, and the capacity for transcendence.

By Rootedness, he urged a loving, disciplined and solid family structure, and a strong identification with one's history and traditions.

By relatedness, Erikson encouraged one's capacity to relate to differing views, and to keep an open and flexible mindset capable of change.

By transcendence, he meant the capacity to meet and rise above personal and group crises, and to find strength in the creative power that structured the physical and ethical universe, the god whose presence is within us all.

During the seminar, I discussed several noted figures with a Jewish identity crisis.

The European Conductor Bruno Walter was eager for promotion to a more prestigious symphony orchestra. He was urged to accept conversion to Christianity, and sent the following letter. "I will accept! Please advise which religious group you wish me to embrace."

The European Poet-Philosopher, Heinrich Heine, whose Jewish identity caused him to cry "Das Judentum ist Meine Unglick" - Judaism is my misfortune.

The art critic Bernhard Berenson had a real crisis. In Boston he became an Episcopalian, and when he was the art historian and critic of the Italian masters, he converted to Catholicism. In fact, he became so fervently a Roman Catholic, that he dismissed all non-Catholics as irreligious.

Perhaps one of the most profound identity crisis was that of Walter Lippman of the New York Times. Born to a Jewish family, everyone at the Times was instructed never to even suggest that Lippman was Jewish. During the Holocaust, the few articles that he wrote indicated that the manner in which European Jews behaved was reason enough for the death camps.

Rootedness, relatedness, transcendence must be a goal of our religious teaching if identity crises are to be replaced by self esteem, maturity, and self worth.

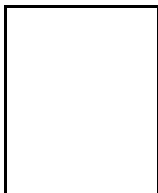

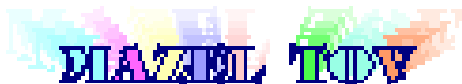

I wish all of you another month of good health, happiness and prosperity.

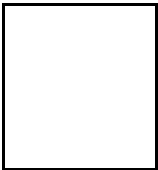



Rabbi Jack Bemporad is the Director of the Center for Interreligious Understanding, located in Secaucus, NJ and visiting Professor at the Pontifical St. Thomas Aquinas University (the Lateran University) in Rome. As co-chairman of the Rabbinic Committee for Interreligious Understanding, Rabbi Bemporad organizes and conducts meetings with prominent Jewish and Catholic leaders to study each other's religious beliefs.

In August 1995, Rabbi Bemporad received the prestigious Liminosa Award of the Focolare Movement. The presentation was made in Hyde Park, NY before a gathering of approximately 1,000 people. In May 1996, Rabbi Bemporad received the Raoul Wallenberg Humanitarian Leadership Award of the Center for Holocaust and Genocide Studies of Ramapo College.

I have now been associated with this congregation for five full months and have just begun the sixth month. It has been a very special kind of life for me and many of you have made me feel at home. Thank you!

There have been some memorable moments which deserve mention; these relate to the people I have met, not all of them members of Temple Israel but people with whom I had dealing in past years.

For example, there is the couple whose children and grandchildren belong to our congregation but in terms of the older couple, I was the assistant rabbi to the grandmother when I first started out in Baltimore. What a joy to meet her again and to be reminded of what life was like "back then".

There is also the man who sang in the choir of my congregation in New York City and there is the lady whose father's store I entered many times over the years when I was growing up. Some of our own members approached me to say that they knew my old neighborhood because of their personal or business life, early on, in the city. It seems that there is always a connection to something or someone in your life years back.

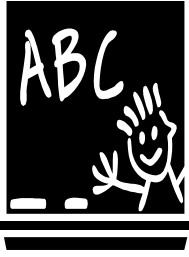

JEW VS. JEW
By Samuel Freedman

At a time when American Jews should feel more secure and cohesive than ever, civil war is tearing apart their community. Congregations, neighborhoods, even families are taking sides in battles about Jewish identity and Jewish authenticity. The conflict pits fundamentalist against secularist, denomination against denomination, even liberal against conservative within each branch of Jewry. Jew vs. Jew tells the story of how American Jewry has increasingly—and perhaps terminally -broken apart in the last forty years.

First, far from unifying American Jews, Israel now divides them on both political and religious grounds. Second, neither America nor the larger world present Jews with a single enemy against whom to coalesce. Third, and most important, nothing in the Jewish history of persecution, oppression, and exile prepared the Chosen People for the challenge posed by America, the challenge of being accepted so thoroughly that the intermarriage rate tops 50 percent.
